Guest Speaker: Richard Griessman



Richard was introduced by Ant Martin who announced that Richard had just become a NZ citizen and called for a round of applause.

Richard shared a personal milestone of pledging allegiance to New Zealand on March 11, humorously reflecting on the significance of gaining citizenship in a country he admires. He recounted a memorable moment from the ceremony, where he recited the national anthem in both Māori and English. Despite his pride in being a Kiwi, he remains equally proud of his American citizenship, hinting at a deep connection to both nations.

Richard subsequently shifted his focus to American politics, particularly the dynamics surrounding the 2020 election, illustrating how first-time voters played a crucial role in Donald Trump's victory.

He elaborated on the polarized political climate in the U.S., where longstanding party loyalties have shifted dramatically. Richard noted that many disillusioned voters switched their allegiance to Trump, driven by a perception that he could address their grievances more effectively than established Democrats. While acknowledging Trump's controversial tactics, he praised his ability to connect with voters through social media and dynamic rallies. This engagement has contributed to a stark divide, with partisan responses differing significantly based on party affiliation, particularly regarding recent political scandals.

In conclusion, Richard called for a new approach to political dialogue, emphasizing the need for open communication and understanding across partisan lines. He proposed experiments in deliberative democracy, where diverse groups can engage in meaningful discussions about contentious issues, seeking common ground rather than division. Drawing from examples of successful political cooperation, he advocated for a culture of listening and collaboration to address pressing societal challenges, urging New Zealanders not to become complacent about their political environment.

Erie Meyer thanked Richard, on behalf of the members, for sharing his inside knowledge of American politics and leaving us with food for thought on our own political landscape.
